Survivor Story: Peace, Safety & Gratitude

*66 With this drawing, I was trying to show that I can stay in a place* of peace and safety by embracing gratitude, even though there is a lot of turbulence outside.

I lived with an emotionally abusive and threatening spouse for a long time and separated from him last year. My situation still feels tenuous and raw at times, even though I am making headway on doing the things that need to happen as I rebuild my life.

There are so many details I have to attend to, that having A Window Between Worlds' Survivors' Art Circle\* is a form of self-care for me. It's something that I do only for me — not my child or other people in my life. It's exclusively for me and for building me up."



in response to the prompt "What does it mean to you to look at your life through a lens of gratitude?" The artist's name and location has been kept anonymous for the safety of the survivor.

\* AWBW's Survivors' Art Circle (SAC) is a confidential peerto-peer support group open to any member of the public who identifies as a domestic and/or sexual violence survivor. SAC members meet virtually once a month, creating art in community as a way to explore their past, present, and take positive steps toward the future.

ast year, as we honored the 30th anniversary of A Window Between Worlds (AWBW) using art to heal and transform trauma, we experienced some of the most significant programmatic growth recorded in any given year; a 63% increase in Facilitators using our healing arts curriculum, and a 50% increase in the number of survivors we serve to 60,000 nationwide and abroad.

It is for this reason that we choose GRATITUDE as the theme for our 2021 Impact Report.








#### Our circle of sustaining donors grew by 46% in 2021!



*66 I'm not an artist. What I am is a human being just seeking expression.* And, since discovering AWBW I've personally seen how art transforms lives.

When I looked at these paintings I created, I felt shame; like they were childlike figures and questioned what I was doing. But shame is what prevents us from getting to what we really feel — it is the barrier to what's really underneath. And the shame is an old belief system.

It's amazing how far I've come. When I was a teenager, I tried to commit suicide. I was at the bottom, slowly climbing my way out in order to survive. I then spent my life striving for perfection, a straight "A" student, a successful business woman, always a perfect appearance — all at the expense of knowing who I truly am on the inside.

I found great healing in creating these paintings — and in all the art that I have created through my connection to AWBW. I've been able to recognize that whatever showed up on the paper was a reflection of me, and that's what I want — to be free to be my true self.


There are always moments of challenge. But now I have art to give my emotions a voice."


